# School area system creates interactive communities

We welcome your questions, input and participation as we know it is through working together that we can create the best environment to support your students.

Clovis Unified School District is the 14th largest public education school district in California with about 43,500 students. It operates five traditional high schools, five intermediate schools and 34 elementary schools, and it also oversees eight specialty and alternative schools within its 198-square-mile boundary.

But don't let the large size fool you. The district's school area system breaks the district into sections that allow for access and personal contact.

It helps to know our history, and where this critical piece of Clovis Unified culture originated. In 1960 the families and leaders of seven local schools decided to join into one district in order to combine resources, insights, ideas and talents that would benefit their children in ways they could not do on their own. Teamwork, dedication and communication set Clovis Unified on a path toward success.

When the district was still small, it was likely easy to maintain those dynamic relationships between the team of administrators, educators and community that benefitted students.

That's not something we are willing to lose as our size grows. In order to maintain that same interactive approach, the district is now divided into five school areas and an educational service area that each has an overseeing area superintendent.

Each school area includes a high school and its feeder intermediate and elementary schools. We proudly have Bear Nation (Buchanan), Cougar Country (Cloric) The Verla Bear Station (Stationary Country)

(Clovis), The Wolf Pack (Clovis East), The Stampede (Clovis North) and Eagle Country (Clovis West)! Educational Services includes our online, alternative and specialty schools.

And, with a sixth high school and intermediate school currently under construction, a new school area is already under development. The yet-unnamed area has an area superintendent who is ready to work with staff and the community as the region forms in the next few years, and plans for the new high school area's boundaries begin this year.

## **HOW TO CONTACT US**

Parents and the community are invited to connect with us by contacting a child's classroom teacher, school administrator or area superintendent. School websites list staff and administrator contact information. During back-to-school night, teachers will review with parents the best method to contact them – some prefer emails, others like phone calls or texts.

Teachers generally should be a parent's first stop with a question, and if it isn't classroom related, they can point you in the right direction for other resources. Parents are always welcome to contact school staff as well, including the principal or a school's area superintendent if the question is bigger than your local school.

Working together side by side, we can make a powerful team for our students this year, and the many years to come!

## CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Clovis Unified's Child Development team offers academic enrichment and childcare for those who are in need of specialized services. They serve the unique needs of the diverse populations within CUSD, as well as provide a bridge between home and school.



Activities are designed to be a balance of educational, social, and recreational opportunities for the children attending.

The programs are:

• EXPANDED LEARNING CLUB: With a new name this school year, this before- and after-school program offers academic support and enrichment opportunities for students in grades TK-6 at most CUSD elementary school sites. The Expanded Learning Club replaces the district's three former programs (Campus Club, ASES and ELOP). This is a fee-based program, but fees will be waived for qualifying families. PRESCHOOL: Clovis Unified offers

two types of preschool programs: state funded and private pay at multiple elementary sites. All programs run three hours per day and five days per week. The state-funded programs are available at no-cost to qualifying families. Details: 327-9180, cusd.com/Preschool.

• YOUTH PARENT PROGRAM: This program serves pregnant or parenting teens and their children, and its goal is to assist students in earning their high school diploma while providing helpful resources and services. Details: 327-9186, cusd.com/YouthParentProgram.

of bakers, cooks, nutrition and cafeteria employees who create healthful, tasty breakfast and lunch meals, which are available at no cost for all Clovis Unified students.

Campus Catering serves more than five million meals annually. By introducing a variety of choices like fresh fruits and vegetables, whole grains and lean proteins, the Campus Catering team is teaching students to develop healthy eating habits while also providing a delicious meal to fuel them for learning.

The food service team hosts taste tests and focus groups with students throughout the school year to make sure our menus are full of customer favorites like breaded chicken drumsticks, crispy chicken salad, freshly baked whole-grain rolls and more.

## TRANSPORTATION

Clovis Unified school buses provide transportation to and from school for students who live outside an established radius zone and for those meeting the eligibility criteria for ridership.

All student riders use a bus ID card that is swiped when boarding or departing a bus. Called Tyler Drive, the program helps with student safety, route tracking, maintaining seating capacities and ensuring students are departing at the correct bus stop.

Bus passes for returning students remain valid to use, and new students who are eligible will receive a pass in the first weeks of school. Replacement passes are available for a small fee. Learn more and find bus schedules at cusd.com/Transportation.

# Meet our new Superintendent Corrine Folmer, Ed.D.

*Editor's Note:* Clovis Unified's Governing Board appointed Corrine Folmer, Ed.D., an educator and administrator with CUSD for 23 years, to the position of Superintendent starting this school year. Here, Dr. Folmer answers our questions about her background, interests and goals.

### Tell us about your family and who lives at your home?

I'm married, have two daughters and a full farm of animals, including horses, goats, dogs and a single cat.

## Where did you go to school?

I earned my doctorate degree, master's degree and bachelor's degree at California State University, Fresno. I attended Clovis Unified schools from kindergarten through 12th grade: Jefferson Elementary (kindergarten); Weldon Elementary (Grades 1-6); Clark Intermediate (Grade 7); Alta Sierra Intermediate (Grade 8; due to a boundary change); and Buchanan High (Grades 9-12).

## Where did you grow up?

I was born in Bryan, Texas, and lived in Texas, until about the age of 5. We then moved back to Clovis where I completed all of my K-12 education. I loved my educational experience in Clovis Unified. I had teachers and school staff who were always caring and believed in me.

## What did you enjoy about Clovis Unified as a student?

I was blessed in my education to have been surrounded with phenomenal teachers! I learned so much from each one of them as they helped develop me academically and as a person. With our 52 school campuses opening in just a few weeks, there are steps parents and students can take now to get ready for a great school year.

The following tips are offered by Clovis Unified teachers, staff and administrators that will help children get ready! **BEFORE SCHOOL STARTS** 



ready the first week of school can help the whole family keep things running smooth.

## **AFTER SCHOOL STARTS:** PARENTS

■ Make sure your child eats breakfast to have energy for the day. Have students bring a water bottle to keep hydrated (campuses have water stations to fill them up). Pack a good lunch. Send a few healthy snacks. Ensure your child gets enough sleep. Doctors recommend children up to the fifth grade get as much as 10 to 11 hours of sleep each night.

■ Visit school to help your student become familiar with where things are. Be sure to find your child's classroom(s). Note where the restroom, library, cafeteria and nurse's office are located.

■ Identify your child's drop-off and pick-up place on the school site. If a child is in the afterschool Expanded Learning Club or taking a bus home, be sure your child knows where to go.

■ If your child will be walking to school, practice the route together. Consider arranging for your child to walk to school with a friend or child in the neighborhood.

■ Visit the school website for information including school start and end times, Back-to-School Night dates and daily menus. There is also a full listing of teachers and administrative staff, including contact information.

Does your child want to play sports or participate in cocurricular activities? Find out about offerings and signups on the school website, and have fun helping your child prepare and begin to practice.

Ease students back into a regular school schedule. The week before school starts, have students go to bed and wake up earlier a little more each day, moving them closer to what the school bedtime/wake-up routine will be.

Grab a good book. If students have not been reading this summer, there is still time to warm up those skills. Have bedtime reading with younger students.

Prepare a homework station in your home. A quiet place with good lighting and a desk or table works great. Kids can help get it ready with a few supplies and decorations, like a drawing of their school mascot.

Go back-to-school shopping if needed. Keep in mind Clovis Unified's dress code if purchasing clothes. On many teachers' websites (found through the school website), class supply lists are available. Other items to consider are a backpack, water bottle or athletic shoes.

■ Have your child plan out what he or she will wear for the first day of school.

Talk about what that first day may be like and ask your child how he or she feels about it. Offer reassurance, enthusiasm and support. Let them know it's OK to be nervous and that lots of other students feel the very same way.

Encourage your child to enter the new school year with a mindset of meeting new people and having new experiences. Talk about getting involved at school and joining at least one activity such as a club, academic or sports team, or the performing arts.

■ Fuel the body well. Take a shopping trip with your child now to help choose foods that are nutritious and that they will enjoy bringing to school.

Pre-make a few dinners that can be frozen. Having meals

Establish regular weekday routines for school, homework, mealtime and bedtime.

■ Have your child go to bed organized with backpack, P.E. or co-curricular clothes and equipment ready for the next day.

Make lunches the night before.

Drive safe. Stop when school bus red lights are flashing, indicating students are boarding or exiting, and pay attention to crossing guards and school speed limits.

■ Keep informed through the school's website. Review all materials the school sends home.

■ If the first couple of days are a little difficult, remain positive and calm. Let your child know you care and are there to support him or her.

Check in with your child after school. Review homework. Follow your student's progress on ParentConnect. If a child begins to struggle in a subject, contact the teacher.

■ Help your child learn how to keep organized by creating check lists or using a daily planner. Students should note their homework assignments, upcoming deadlines, practice schedules, club meeting times, when permission slips are due and any other important dates.

Plan down time for your child. Kids do better with some time to play or relax. Encourage them to go outside, listen to music, ride a bike or play a game.

Attend Back-to-School Night and meet your child's teacher. This informative night provides parents with an un-

## Educational Benefit Survey can help you and your school!

Families are urged to fill out the Educational Benefit Survey that is part of the Annual Information Update and can also be

found online at cusd.com/EducationalBenefit-Survey. Results of this survey provide important information that could lead to students qualifying for benefits like free afterschool care, discounted home internet and waived college application fees; it can also help schools to receive additional state funding for programs like mental health supports and college/career readiness.

Previously this form qualified students for no-cost meals, but with public school meals now free to all students in California, eligible families may not think it necessary to complete the survey form. The information, however, remains critical to access state and federal funding to support students in need.

The state's Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) provides an additional \$2,150 to districts that have students that meet the criteria of being economically disadvantaged, an English learner and/or a foster youth. The Educational Benefit Survey takes only a few minutes to complete and helps to identify qualifying students. All information submitted is a confidential education record and is protected by all relevant federal and state privacy laws that pertain to educational records.

## Annual information review

Each year Clovis Unified School District requires parents or guardians to review district policies and to review their home address, contact phone numbers, emergency and health information for their student that is contained in Parent Connect.

The update process is currently in progress. Per Clovis Unified policy and student safety, this information must be reviewed and updated before the new school year begins Aug 21. Students will not receive their schedule or teacher assignments until the forms are completed.

Emails have been sent to all parents and guardians on file with full instructions. The updates can be accessed through Parent Connect accounts using https://qweb.clovisusd.k12 .ca.us/ParentPortal. A temporary Parent Connect Help Desk is available at 327-0789.

*In other action, the board:* ■ Received two annual written reports on the Expanded Learning and Preschool programs offered in the district.

■ Held a public hearing related to plans to enter into negotiations with CSEA Chapter 250 on all articles of its existing collective bargaining agreement.

■ Approved annual agreements for services for students provided by Educational Mental Health Associates, Comprehensive Youth Services, BICC Central California, and JDT Consultants.

• Approved the annual Community Funded Bus Routes for areas of the community within the transportation walk-in radius but interested in obtaining transportation services from the District.

■ Accepted the Williams Settlement Report noting that

zero complaints were received during the fourth quarter.

■ Approved updated elementary educational specifications to guide facility standards for the district's elementary schools.

• Approved employment contracts for the recently appointed assistant superintendent of Instructional Services, and the administrator of Student Services and School Attendance.

■ Approved a resolution declaring an exemption to the separation of service agreement for one employee whose services are required prior to the end of the STRS wait period.

## June 14

The June 14 meeting marked the last meeting of retiring Superintendent Eimear O'Brien, Ed.D., and the Governing Board paused before the conclusion of their meeting to recognize her for leading the district with wisdom, courage and integrity since 2017. Earlier in the day, the board held its annual Celebration of Retirees to honor the contributions of 130 retiring employees whose combined service represents more than 3,200 years dedicated to the students of the Clovis Unified School District.

In June, the Governing Board annually adopts its budget for the upcoming school year and historically has considered recommendations from the Employee Compensation Committee (ECC) about possible salary schedule adjustments. At the meeting, the Governing Board took action to approve a 5.5% increase to the district's regular and co-curricular salary schedules for the 2023-24 school year.

ACE School Psychologists and Mental Health Support Providers (ACE), whose contract (also ratified by the Governing Board June 14) included a "me too" clause for salaries during the 2023-24 school year of 3.5% or anything greater recommended by the ECC, are included in this 5.5% salary schedule change.

Members of CSEA Chapter 250 are excluded at this time because of their request to negotiate their bargaining agreement. In approving the ECC recommendation, several members of the Governing Board thanked its members and their commitment to advocating for employees while also balancing the pressures of the district's total finances.

At a future meeting, the Governing Board anticipates consideration of a contract to complete the ECC-recommended reclassification study to ensure positions are appropriately placed on salary schedules. Implementation of such a study would require separate, future action by the Governing Board.

Governing Board members also took time in the meeting to thank Dr. Robyn Castillo, associate superintendent of instructional services, who is leaving the district after 27 years to serve as the superintendent of Natomas Unified School District in the Sacramento area.

Earlier in the meeting, Monica Castillo, current principal of the Clovis Online School, was appointed to the new role of Assistant Superintendent of Instructional Services overseeing Special Education and Nursing Services for the district. Her appointment was made following a decision not to backfill the associate superintendent position vacated by Dr. Castillo's departure and instead shift the reporting structure of these two areas to report to Deputy Superintendent Norm Anderson.

## In other action, the board:

■ Heard a report on cultural proficiency work underway across the district and heard from student members of Dr. O'Brien's Inter Cultural and Diversity Advisory Council on their experiences attending elementary school multicultural meetings around the district.

■ Approved, in addition to the 2023-24 budget, a variety of budget-related items including Resolution No. 3927 – Education Protection Account, No. 3932 Governing Standards Accounting Board Statement 54 Committed Funds, a public disclosure of collective bargaining related to employees, and the Special Education Service and Budget Plan.

■ Adopted the collective bargaining agreement of the district and ACE Psychologists and Mental Health Support Providers, a copy of which is available in the agenda materials for the June 14 meeting. The three-year agreement covers 2022-2023, 2023-2024 and 2024-2025.

■ Approved the annual Local Control Accountability Plans for the district and for Clovis Online School for the upcoming school year. The plans detail input received from parents, students and staff, and outlines programs and services to support seven key areas of student achievement and involvement. The plans are available from the Curriculum, Instruction and Accountability Office or the Clovis Online School.

• Awarded supplies, services and construction bids for the rebid of Clovis West High School Ceramics Classroom Renovation, non-perishables for the Sierra Outdoor School, portable sitework, campus security improvements phase I, and custodial supplies.

■ Received written reports on the annual California Dashboard Local Indicators and the Advancement Via Individual Determination Progress Report.

■ Accepted a grant to fund a teacher residency program in the district.

■ Authorized the use of piggyback bids from various cooperative and school district bid contracts for software, supplies and equipment needed for district sites and programs.

■ Approved the appointment of the recommended members to serve on the Clovis Unified Special Education Community Advisory Committee in accordance with the committee's bylaws.


■ Approved the issuance and sale of 2023 refunding of general obligation bonds to achieve interest savings on exiting facility bonds. The Board also took action to establish the annual tax rate for bond repayment.

■ Held a public hearing to provide members of the community an opportunity to comment on the School Facilities Needs Analysis to establish Level II School Facilities Fees. No one was present to address the Board during the public hearing and later in the meeting the Needs Analysis was approved, along with updated Level II facilities fees and the filing of a notice of exemption from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) related to the fees.

■ Approved the sale of Certificates of Participation to finance capital facility projects and approved related documents and action.

■ Authorized the filing of a notice of exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) regarding the adoption of a school facilities needs analysis to set Level II Facilities fees.

■ Approved the annual application for funding of the Perkins Grant supporting career technical education programs in the district.

■ Authorized the placement of a special education student in a non-public school to received services identified in the students' individualized education plan.

■ Approved a triennial memorandum of understanding between the Clovis Unified SELPA and the Central Valley Regional Center to provide early intervention services for children between the ages of 0-3 years old.

■ Approved the annual memorandum of understanding with the California Teaching Fellows Foundation for the upcoming school year to provide additional instructional assistants and direct support to all students who qualify for Clovis Unified's Every Student Succeeds Act Program and other programs in the district.
