# The goal in Mind

- that all of our students are making it to graduation and receiving their diploma
- 96.4% of our class of 2022 seniors earned their diplomas (81 out of 84), slightly above the district's graduation rate of 95.8%!
- All foster youth seniors, homeless, and Migrant Ed graduated AND are enrolled in college. They all will be 1st generation, college students!
- 11 students earned scholarships (9 seniors, 2 juniors)




# What is LCAP?



### **Expanded Learning Program**

In 2023-24, our three existing child development offerings are joining forces to become one program, available at every elementary school, that wraps around the school day and offers opportunities for students in grades TK-6.

### This exciting new comprehensive learning program is:

- Free at Title Land Community Eligible Provision (CEP) schools, and for students qualifying as English Learner. foster or homeless, or eligible for free/reduced price meals
- Enrichment based, offering academic support (like homework time and intervention hours); health and wellness activities (like lifestyle sports and recreation and social emotional skill building; STEM, arts and music activities; and so much more....
- Offered to students grades TK-6th
- · Wrapped around the school day with hours from 7 a.m. to the first bell and from the dismissal bell to either 5:30 p.m. for free programs and 6 p.m. at fee-based sites. (TK/K schedule varies by site)
- Available for those enrolled a minimum of three days a week, attending until at least 4 p.m.

Existing programs in place currently are growing into a new, comprehensive learning program soon to have its own unique name.

### ASES

- · Serving grades 2 6
- · After school only until 6 p.m.
- · Requires attendance five days a week until 6 p.m.
- · Free to eligible students at Title I schools
- · Includes academic support, health and wellness, and enrichment

### Campus Club

- Serving grades TK-6 Before and after school from
- 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Fee-based
- Requires an enrollment minimum of 6 hours a week
- Offered homework time, outdoor structured activities and enrichment
  - price meals Requires minimum participation of three days a week until 4 p.m. Includes academic support, health and wellness, and enrichment

AM TK/Kindergarten Care is offered to students with a PM TK/Kindergarten placement and PM TK/Kindergarten Care is offered to students with an AM TK/Kindergarten placement.

. (Programs are offered based on enrollment. Both sessions may not be offered at all sites)

Expanded Learning staff will always pick up or drop off students from their TK/Kindergarten classrooms. Students are taken to lunch during both AM and PM TK/Kindergarten Care programs. Students may bring lunch from home or receive lunch from the cafeteria.

During large group and enrichment activities, students will engage in the following subjects:

- · Weather, calendar, music + movement
- . Math, science, writing, cooking, art, and literacy

Wednesday is Early Release dismissal for all students. Expanded Learning staff will pick up or drop off students at the appropriate early release Wednesday time.

TK/Kindergarten families may also add After School Care (example: 2:45-6:00) on student application if needed.
