Each year, Clovis Unified School District receives Title VI Indian Education Funds of the: Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015. This school year, CUSD currently serves 513 Native American Students. The funds are designed to meet and support the special educational and culturally related academic needs of American Indians and Alaska Natives, so that student scan achieve to the same challenging State performance standards expected by all students. The purpose of this survey is to assess the effectiveness of the Title VI program activities and to determine what action needs to be taken, if any, to increase parental participation. This year, our grant has allowed us to fund an additional 14 instructional aides to serve K-12 students at 44 different school sites. This information, combined with staff information, achievement scores, and other data, will be used as a basis for planning the District Title VI Indian Education Program. Also, this survey seems like it is really geared toward elementary parents. We don't have parent/teacher conferences at the secondary level unless requested by teacher or parent. Also, it's hard to be super involved with a high school classroom or school site. They have too many classes and the school site has so many things going on. You tend to be inolved with what your kids are involved in.
