Number of Title I Schools in CUSD

Schools must meet eligibility requirements to become a Title I School. The eligibility is based on the number of students receiving free and reduced lunch. This number is calculated in the fall of each year on CBEDS Day. CBEDS Day is when schools in California submit enrollment numbers for their district. Seventeen CUSD elementary and secondary schools are designated Title I Schools serving over 10,000 students. Schools include:

CUSD Title I Program

On an annual basis CUSD submits the Application for Reporting System commonly called CARS. The categorical programs included in the application are Title I, Part C – Migrant Education, Title II, Part A – Preparing, Training and Recruiting High Quality Teachers and Principals, and Title III – Language Instruction for Limited English Proficient and Immigrant Students.

Parents continue to make positive differences in the lives of the children we all support. The Purpose of Title I Funds & Program

Its purpose is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education, and reach proficiency on the state content standards and assessments. The intent of the funding is to meet the educational needs of the low-achieving students enrolled in the highest poverty schools.

Annual Title I Parent Survey

CUSD administers an Annual Parent Survey. The purpose of this annual survey is to assess the effectiveness of the Title I Program. This information, combined with staff information, achievement scores, and other data points are used as a basis for program planning. This year, 81% of the parents indicated they knew where to get help if their child is struggling, while 75% felt there were adequate opportunities for parents to become involved. 96% indicated that their child is receiving a quality education. Additional information is available at your child's school.

Goals of Title I Programs

- Increase student achievement
- Requires that schools be accountable to all students and their academic growth
- Requires that parents are provided assistance in understanding how well their school and their child is performing.

Title I Funds In The Public Schools

- Allocated on the basis of number of students eligible for free/reduced meals
- Title I Students receive everything all other students receive plus services from Title I funding
- Requires academic interventions for all eligible students to assist in mastering state standards
- Requires parent input and training
